TMSA Young Trad Tour -

Each year before Covid we gathered the winners and finalists of the BBC Radio Scotland Young Traditional Music of the Year Competition and took them out to their hometowns and other locations – such as the Houses of Parliament/Cecil Sharp House in London, Lorient Interceltique Festival in France and a concert in Celtic Connections Festival in Glasgow.

Since the disruption of the pandemic, we have managed to reinstate the Celtic Connections concert (the photo is of members of the 2023 & 2024 groups preparing for the Celtic

concert) but are still rebuilding up to the tour aspect of the project. The position of Executive Officer will greatly help in this rebuilding.
